It emphasizes the importance of advocating literacy for every child regardless of linguistic and cultural background. The celebration is cross-cultural and intergenerational. In the words of one of the founders of this annual event, author Pat Mora: "April 30th has become a day for remembering the power of words and books in the lives of our young people and for honoring all the languages spoken in the homes of this country.

One in five of our school children comes from a home in which a language other than English is spoken. By honoring these languages, we celebrate our linguistic and cultural wealth."

Emotional Intelligence

Did You Know?

Understanding how one and others feel, how to express emotions in an appropriate way, and how to manage one's emotions are part of one's "emotional intelligence". Research shows that children with higher emotional intelligence have better ability to pay attention, empathize with others, and engage with peers in school.

What Can You Do?

Researchers Brackett and Rivers have identified 5 skills to foster children's, as well as our own, emotional intelligence, using the acronym RULER.

Recognize: what does the feeling look or feel like?

Understand: what caused the feeling?

Label: what words can describe the feeling?

Express: How can I show this feeling in an appropriate way?

Regulate—How can I shift or maintain this feeling?

Adults can help children develop these skills by

- modeling these skills, •
- having conversations with kids about feelings,
- teaching a wide range of vocabulary for feelings,
- reading books, playing with puppets or games,
- teaching strategies such as taking deep breaths, positive self talk, and problem solving skills,
- using everyday situations to let . child practice the RULER skills.

When reading together, you can ask your child about the character in the book-Tommy's face is red and he is clenching his fists, how do you think he feels? What do you think made him feel this way? What did he do when he felt this way? What did he do to help himself feel better?



- For the paper reading log Cross off or color in 1 circle for each book read. It's ok to count a book more than once if it is read several times.
- There are 100 circles on each paper reading log.
- When you complete a log, show or tell the youth services librarian at any branch library how many books you have read. You can get additional logs to continue tracking.
- If you are using the mobile app for tracking, show a youth services librarian how many books you have read.
- Your child will receive a reward for participating and reaching these milestones at any branch library:

100 books, 500 books, and 1000 books read
