Antediluvian (an-tee-di-**loo**-vee-*uh*n) *Lat* - very old, old-fashioned, or out of date; antiquated; primitive

• Your *antediluvian* ideas of fashion seem to include bustles and hoop skirts.

Deliquescence (del-i-kwes-uhns) Lat – the act of melting away, tendency to melt

• The summer *deliquescence* of popsicles running up the forearm is a childhood staple.

Logorrhea (law-guh-**ree**-uh) NL - pathologically incoherent, repetitious speech; incessant or compulsive talkativeness

• Obviously, the publisher saw a one-time author with severe *logorrhea* problems.

Phantasmagoria (fan-taz-m*uh*-**gawr**-ee-*uh*) *F* - a shifting series of illusions or deceptive appearances, as in a dream or as created by the imagination.

• Filmmaker Terry Gilliam buries them up to the eyeballs in *phantasmagoria*.

Interlocutory (in-ter-**lok**-yuh-tawr-ee) Lat - of the nature of, pertaining to, or occurring in conversation

• They're objecting to everything, entering what are called *interlocutory* appeals.

Autochthonous (aw-**tok**-th*uh*-n*uh*s) *Gk* - aboriginal; indigenous, formed in the region where found

• Heroes emerge as *autochthonous* beings from the nation/state, rising up to defend it in its time of need. (Andrew Bickford)

Pococurante (**poh**-koh-koo-ran-tee) *IT* - a careless or indifferent person

• The only child of an interminably famous literary theorist, and now *pococurante* chair of the English Department, Hank published one critically acclaimed novel.

Fluxion (fluhk-shuhn) - an act of flowing

• Their bodies continually going up and down upon perpetual *fluxion*, they never could live if their minds did the same, like the minds of stationary landsmen.

Loquacious (loh-**kwey**-sh*uh*s) *Lat* - talking or tending to talk much or freely; talkative; chattering; babbling; garrulous

• He who seldom speaks, and with one calm well-timed word can strike dumb the *loquacious*, is a genius or a hero.

Borborygmus (bawr-b*uh*-**rig**-m*uh*s) *NL* - a rumbling or gurgling sound caused by the movement of gas in the intestines

• *Borborygmus* is the audible result of the process of peristalsis.

Ennui (ahn-**wee**) F - a feeling of utter weariness and discontent resulting from satiety or lack of interest; boredom

• To love to read is to exchange hours of *ennui* for hours of delight. (Charles de Montesquieu)

Acquiesce (ak-wee-**es**) *F* - to assent tacitly; submit or comply silently or without protest; agree; consent

• The strongest and most effective force in guaranteeing the long-term maintenance of power is not violence in all the forms deployed by the dominant to control the dominated, but consent in all the forms in which the dominated *acquiesce* in their own domination.

Bivouacking (**biv**-oo-ak-ing) *F*- to rest or assemble in a military encampment made with tents or improvised shelters, usually without shelter or protection from enemy fire.

• All the *bivouacking* in the world won't save you from an atom bomb.

Commissar (**kom**-*uh*-sahr, kom-*uh*-**sahr**), *Russ/Ger/ML* - 1*a*: a Communist party official assigned to a military unit to teach party principles and policies and to ensure party loyalty, *b*: one that attempts to control public opinion or its expression, 2: the head of a government department in the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics until 1946

• As *commissar* of war led the Red Army to defeat the Entente in their invasion of Soviet Russia.

Corpuscle (kawr-puh-suh I, -puhs-uh I) L - biology: one of the cells that move in the body; especially: a blood cell

2: a minute particle

• The question whether a *corpuscle* actually has a material gravitating nucleus is undecided, but there are strong reasons for believing that its mass is entirely due to the electric charge.

Ameliorate (*uh*-**meel**-y*uh*-reyt, *uh*-**mee**-lee-*uh*-) [from *L*, meliorate], to make (something, such as a problem) better, less painful, etc.

• Trying to *ameliorate* the suffering of people who have lost their jobs

Recalcitrant (ri-kal-si-truh nt) L - stubbornly refusing to obey rules or orders

1: obstinately defiant of authority or restraint, 2*a*: difficult to manage or operate, *b*: not responsive to treatment *c*: resistant

• A heart-to-heart talk with the *recalcitrant* youth revealed that he had a troubled life at home.

Pernicious (per-**nish**-*uh* s), *L* - causing great harm or damage often in a way that is not easily seen or noticed

• More *pernicious* still has been the acceptance of the author's controversial ideas by the general public.

Soliloquy (suh-lil-uh-kwee), L - a long, usually serious speech that a character in a play makes to an audience and that reveals the character's thoughts

• But if it is hard for the theatergoer to catch all the meanings in Macbeth's rippling *soliloquies,* then how much harder is that task when Shakespeare seems unable or unwilling to unpack his obscurities. —James Wood, *New Republic,* 26 June 2000

Nadir (ney-der, ney-deer), *ME/MF/Arabic* - the worst or lowest point of something
2: the point of the celestial sphere that is directly opposite the zenith and vertically downward from the observer

• The relationship between the two countries reached a *nadir* in the 1920s.

Fennec (fen-ek), *Arabic* - a small pale-fawn fox (*Vulpes zerda* syn. *Fennecus zerda*) with large ears that inhabits the deserts of northern Africa and Arabia

• *Fennecs* are desert-dwelling foxes found in northern Africa and the Sinai and Arabian peninsulas.

Azimuth (az-uh-muh th), *ME/MF/Arabic* - 1: an arc of the horizon measured between a fixed point (as true north) and the vertical circle passing through the center of an object usually in astronomy and navigation clockwise from the north point through 360 degrees, 2: horizontal direction expressed as the angular distance between the direction of a fixed point (as the observer's heading) and the direction of the object

• The number above the beginning of each trace is the source *azimuth* and below is the epicentral distance.

Bezoar (bee-zawr, -zohr), *MF/ML/Arabic/Persian* - any of various calculi found chiefly in the gastrointestinal organs and formerly believed to possess magical properties —called also *bezoar stone*

• The concretions known as *bezoar*-stones, formerly much used in medicine and as antidotes of poison, are obtained from the stomach of the wild goat.

Halal (huh-lahl), Arabic - accepted by Muslim law as fit for eating; selling or serving halal food
The menu has a heavy focus on vegetarian dishes, plus a variety of traditional halal meals

Mihrab (meer-uh b), Arabic - a niche or chamber in a mosque indicating the direction of Mecca
Mihrabs are usually ornately decorated.

Salaam (suh-lahm), Arabic - 1: an obeisance performed by bowing very low and placing the right palm on the forehead, 2: a salutation or ceremonial greeting in the East

• A gong sounds, people *salaam* and the women wear baggy pantaloons and veils.

Coffle (kaw-fuh I, kof-uh I), Arabic - a train of slaves or animals fastened together

• The traders removed the restraints when the *coffle* neared the market.

Alkali (al-kuh-lahy), *ME/ML/Ar* - 1: a soluble salt obtained from the ashes of plants and consisting largely of potassium or sodium carbonate; broadly: a substance (as a hydroxide or carbonate of an alkali metal) having marked basic properties, 2: alkali metal, 3: a soluble salt or a mixture of soluble salts present in some soils of arid regions in quantity detrimental to agriculture

• The mineral trona, a compound of sodium carbonate and bicarbonate, is one naturally occurring *alkali*...

Camphor (kam-fer), *ME/ML/Arabic/Malay* - a white substance with a strong smell that is used in medicine and to keep insects away

: a tough gummy volatile aromatic crystalline compound $C_{10}H_{16}O$ obtained especially from the wood and bark of the camphor tree and used as a liniment and mild topical analgesic in medicine, as a plasticizer, and as an insect repellent

• Camphorated oil is 20% camphor in olive oil.

Minaret (min-*uh*-**ret**, **min**-*uh*-ret), *French/Turkish/Arabic* - a tall, thin tower of a mosque with a balcony from which the people are called to prayer

• They were exceptionally friendly, and even encouraged your correspondent to climb up the *minaret*.

Tamarind (tam-uh-rind), Sp&Pg/Arabic - tropical Old World tree (Tamarindus indica) of the legume family with hard yellowish wood, pinnate leaves, and red-striped yellow flowers; also: its fruit which has an acid pulp often used for preserves or in a cooling laxative drink

• The *tamarind* tree grows about 80 ft (24 m) tall and has featherlike leaves.

Dugong (**doo**-gong, -gawng), *New Latin* (genus)/ probably from dugong in Cebuano or a related Austronesian language of the central Philippines - a Sirenian mammal (*Dugong dugon* of the family Dugongidae) of a monotypic genus that has a bilobed tail and in the male upper incisors altered into short tusks and that inhabits warm coastal waters chiefly of southern Asia, Australia, and northeastern Africa

• The reef is home to tremendous coral diversity as well as numerous species of fish and marine mammals such as the *dugong*.

Pangolin (**pang**-guh-lin, pang-**goh**-), *Malay* - any of a family (Manidae of the order Pholidota) of Asian and African toothless mammals having the body covered dorsally with large imbricated horny scales —called also *scaly anteater*

• When threatened, the *pangolin* (Malayan for "rolling over") curls up or emits an odoriferous secretion.

Mahatma (muh-haht-muh, -hat-), Sanskrit - a person who is respected for being good, wise, and holy

2: a person of great prestige in a field of endeavor

• She is considered a *mahatma* among her people.

Gymkhana (jim-**kah**-n*uh*), *Hindi* - a meet featuring sports contests or athletic skills: as *a*: competitive games on horseback, *b*: a timed contest for automobiles featuring a series of events designed to test driving skill

• In addition, there will be several *gymkhana* games which will provide plenty of fun and excitement for the society folk.

Basmati (bahs-**mah**-tee), *Hindi* - Basmati Rice, a kind of long rice that is used especially in Indian and Middle Eastern cooking.

• White rice is normally used in this common dish, but brown *basmati* is even better.

Gingham (**ging**-*uh* m), *Malay* - a cotton cloth that often is marked with a pattern of colored squares, a clothing fabric usually of yarn-dyed cotton in plain weave

• A red and white *gingham* tablecloth was laid on the ground for the picnic.

Gourami (goo-rah-mee), Malay - any of numerous African and Asian tropical freshwater bony fishes (order Perciformes)

• Other *gouramis*, several of them popular in home aquariums, are Asian members of different genera and families.

Masala (ma-sa-la), Hindi & Urdu - a varying blend of spices used in Indian cooking

• Every time we go there, he orders chicken tikka masala.

Asana (ah-suh-nuh), Sanskrit - any of various yogic postures

• The philosophy of an *asana* practice lies in its mindful execution, not in how far one can go in each pose.

Batik [b*uh*-**teek**, **bat**-ik], *Javanese* - a fabric printed by an Indonesian method of hand-printing textiles by coating with wax the parts not to be dyed; *also*: the method itself

• Communities visited specialize in a number of textile arts; including silk felt manufacture and *batik* dyeing.

Charpoy [**chahr-poi**], *Hindi/Urdu* - a bed used especially in India consisting of a frame strung with tapes or light rope

• A *charpoy* is a bed, and everybody in Rubbulgurh puts one outside, for sociability, in the evening.

Mahout [muh-hout], Hindi/Urdu - a keeper and driver of an elephant

• The donation covers not only vet bills but also the salary of the beast's *mahout*, or elephant handler.

Lahar [lah-hahr], Javanese - a moving fluid mass composed of volcanic debris and water

• The *lahar* was terrifyingly high and steaming hot, they reported.

Ampere [am-peer, am-peer], *French* - the practical meter-kilometer-second unit of electric current that is equivalent to a flow of one coulomb per second or to the steady current produced by one volt applied across a resistance of one ohm

• Parks often base the charge of the site upon the electrical *ampere* hookup.

Jeremiad [jer-*uh*-**mahy**-*uh* d, -ad], *French* - a prolonged lamentation or complaint; *also*: a cautionary or angry harangue

• In fact, the book is a sort of *jeremiad* against environmental threats to the great wilderness areas of the country.

Quixote [kee-hoh-tee, kwik-suh t], Spanish - a quixotic person

• Some consider love stories to have a character that is *quixote*.

Quisling [**kwiz**-ling], *Norwegian* - a person who helps an enemy that has taken control of his or her country

• He warned that all *quislings* would be punished without mercy.

Angstrom [ang-struh m], Swedish - a unit of length equal to one ten-billionth of a meter

• A phosphorus atom has an atomic radius of one *angstrom*.

Tortoni: [tawr-**toh**-nee] ice cream made of heavy cream often with minced almonds and chopped maraschino cherries and often flavored with rum

• There is no better dessert than tortoni.

Bromeliad [broh-**mee**-lee-ad], *New Latin*- any of the chiefly tropical American usually epiphytic plants comprising the pineapple family and including Spanish moss and various ornamentals

• It features the desert garden, succulent garden, moat garden and the new *bromeliad* garden.

Philippic [fi-lip-ik] Latin/Greek - a discourse or declamation full of bitter condemnation

• The head coach was briefly suspended after launching into a foulmouthed *philippic* during a press conference.

Sauerbraten [souuh r-braht-n, sou-er-; German zou-uh r-braht-n] German – oven-roasted or pot-roasted beef marinated before cooking in vinegar with peppercorns, garlic, onions, and bay leaves

• Every time I go to Germany I seek out the best *sauerbraten*.

Tchotchke [chahch-kuh] Yiddish – knickknack, trinket

• A bedroom with polka-dot curtains, flowery wallpaper, and shelves cluttered with *tchotchkes* from a lifetime of vacations.

Perestroika [per-*uh*-**stroi**-*kuh*; *Russian* pyi-<u>ry</u>i-**st**<u>r</u>**oi**-*kuh*] *Russian* – the policy of economic and governmental reform instituted by Mikhail Gorbachev in the Soviet Union during the mid-1980s

• Well, top-down *perestroika* reform did not work for that nice Mr. G. out East, and it won't work for us.

Apparatchik [ah-puh-rah-chik; *Russian* uh-puh-<u>raht</u>-chyik] *Russian* – a very loyal member of an organization (such as a company or political party) who always obeys orders

• The President, Islam Karimov, was a Soviet *apparatchik* who found Muslim fundamentalism a useful justification for repression.

Balalaika [bal-*uh*-**lahy**-k*uh*] *Russian* – a usually 3-stringed instrument of Russian origin with a triangular body played by plucking or strumming

• He plays the *balalaika* with ease.

Mynheer [mahyn-hair, -heer] Dutch – a male Netherlander —used as a title equivalent to Mr.

• When in the Netherlands, be sure to address him as *Mynheer* Smith.

Waterzooi [va-ter-zoy] *Dutch* – a stew of fish or chicken and vegetables in a seasoned stock thickened with cream and egg yolks

• Nothing is more delicious on a cold winter's night then a steaming bowl of *waterzooi*.

Flense [flens] Dutch - to strip (a whale, seal, etc.) of blubber or skin

• I could not contain my revulsion when they told me the next step was to *flense* the seal.

Witloof [wit-lohf] Dutch – chicory; also Belgian endive

• I usually add *witloof* to my salads.

Springbok [spring-bok] Afrikaans - a small, very fast deer that lives in Africa

• *Springbok* are often hunted by cheetahs on the plains of Africa.

Keeshond [keys-hond, kees-] *Dutch* – any of a Dutch breed of compact medium-sized dogs that have a dense heavy grayish coat and a foxy head

• Originally a dog kept by working-class people, the *keeshond* was the symbol of the 18th-century Dutch Patriots Party.

Uitlander [ahyt-lan-der, oit-; *Dutch* <u>eit</u>-lahn-duh <u>r</u>] *Afrikaans* – foreigner; *especially* a British resident in the former republics of the Transvaal and Orange Free State

• The Transvaal's long-established rural population of Boers (Afrikaners), afraid of being overwhelmed, passed laws to restrict the *Uitlanders'* influence.

Obsequious [*uh* b-**see**-kwee-*uh* s] *Middle English* – too eager to help or obey someone important

• She's constantly followed by *obsequious* assistants who will do anything she tells them to.

Philhellene [fil-hel-een] Greek – admiring Greece or the Greeks

• I have long considered myself a *philhellene* because of my obsession with the ruins in Athens and Greek mythology.

Cappelletti [kap-*uh*-**let**-ee; *Italian* kahp-pel-**let**-tee] *Italian* – pasta in the form of little peaked hats filled with a savory mixture

• You will find the most authentic *cappalletti* in Italy.

Pizzicato [pit-si-**kah**-toh; *Italian* peet-tsee-**kah**-taw] *Italian* – used as a direction in music to indicate that notes should be played by plucking the strings of a violin, viola, cello, etc., with the fingers instead of by using a bow

• At this point, the music calls for playing the cello *pizzicato*.

Intaglio [in-**tal**-yoh, -**tahl**-; *Italian* een-**tah**-lyaw] *Italian* – 1. A: an engraving or incised figure in stone or other hard material depressed below the surface so that an impression from the design yields an image in relief; B: the art or process of executing intaglios; C: printing (as in die stamping and gravure) done from a plate in which the image is sunk below the surface; 2. something (as a gem) carved in intaglio

• Examine the quality of embossed stamps and *intaglio* printing.

Nescience [**nesh**-*uh* ns, **nesh**-ee-*uh* ns, **nes**-ee-] *Latin* – lack of knowledge or awareness; ignorance

• The appalling *nescience* of today's high schoolers concerning international affairs outraged us.

Crystalline [**kris**-tl-in, -ahyn, -een] *Middle English/Latin/Greek* – clear and shining like crystal; made of or similar to crystal or crystals

• We could see fish swimming beneath the *crystalline* ice of the frozen lake.

Nucleolus [noo-klee-uh-luh s, nyoo-] Latin – a spherical body of the nucleus of most eukaryotes that becomes enlarged during protein synthesis, is associated with a nucleolus organizer, and contains the DNA templates for ribosomal RNA

• The *nucleolus* is elongated, and its longest measurement lies in the direction of the equatorial plane of the nucleus.

Entablature [en-**tab**-l*uh*-cher, -choo r] *French/Italian* – a horizontal part in classical architecture that rests on the columns and consists of architrave, frieze, and cornice

• While it was probably badly wrecked by the Romans at the sack of the city, its massive columns with the *entablature* survived.

Sanguine [sang-gwin] Middle English – confident and hopeful

• She has a *sanguine* disposition.

Quietus [kwahy-**ee**-t*uh* s] *Middle English* – final settlement (as of a debt); removal from activity, *especially* death; something that quiets or represses

• She was granted a *quietus* on the remainder of the debt in the old man's will.

Ferrule [**fer**-*uh* I, -ool] *Middle English/French/Latin*– a usually metal ring or cap that is placed around the end of a wooden stick or handle to strengthen it

• Neither stick has a *ferrule*, or any indication that one was ever fitted.

Rubicund [roo-bi-kuhnd] Middle English/Latin – having red or pink skin

• The *rubicund* face of his father.

Panoply [**pan**-*uh*-plee] *Greek* - a group or collection that is impressive because it is so big or because it includes so many different kinds of people or things

• Nobody saw a *panoply* of State, local or even federal taxes and compliance regulations on the Internet as constructive.

Rebarbative [ree-bahr-buh-tiv] French - repellent, irritating

• There are aspects of that writer's personality that any reasonable person would regard as *rebarbative*, but we're just reading his novels—not marrying him.

Aventurine [*uh*-**ven**-ch*uh*-reen, -rin] *French* - glass containing opaque sparkling particles of foreign material (as copper or chromic oxide)

• Please note that the round *aventurine* beads are paler than the photo shows.

Peripatetic [per-*uh*-p*uh*-**tet**-ik] *Middle French & Latin* – of, relating to, or given to walking, moving or traveling from place to place

• She worked as a *peripatetic* journalist for most of her life.

Gravitas [grav-i-tahs, -tas] Latin – a very serious quality or manner

• The new leader has an air of gravitas that commands respect.

Flagitious [fluh-jish-uh s] Middle English - marked by scandalous crime or vice

• His *flagitious* crimes are well known throughout the country.

Trilobite [**trahy**-l*uh*-bahyt] *Greek* - any of numerous extinct Paleozoic marine arthropods (group Trilobita) having the segments of the body divided by furrows on the dorsal surface into three lobes

• They found a number of *trilobite* fossils during the archaeological dig.

Politesse [pol-i-tes; French paw-lee-tes] *French* - formal politeness : decorousness

• We've known each other for years so you needn't use that *politesse* tone with me.

Celesta [*suh*-**les**-t*uh*] *French* - a keyboard instrument with hammers that strike steel plates producing a tone similar to that of a glockenspiel

• One of the most interesting instruments sometime seen in an orchestra is the *celesta*.

Ortolan [**awr**-tl-*uh* n] *French* - an Old World bunting (*Emberiza hortulana*) having a greenishgray head and breast, streaky brown back and wings, and a yellow throat

• And if you can stomach his account of how to prepare and eat an *ortolan*, you've got a stronger constitution than me.

Theodicy [thee-**od**-*uh*-see] *French* - defense of God's goodness and omnipotence in view of the existence of evil

• Traditional *theodicy*, he writes, can make no sense of the theological issues posed by the Nazi onslaught against the Jews.

Isochronous [ahy-**sok**-r*uh*-n*uh* s] *Greek* – isochronal uniform in time: having equal duration: recurring at regular intervals

• In so far as the vibrations may be regarded as *isochronous*, the distance between consecutive corresponding points of the recurrent figure, or, as it may be called, the wavelength of the figure is directly proportional to the velocity of the jet.

Accoutrement [*uh*-**koo**-ter-m*uh* nt, -tr*uh*-] - equipment, trappings; *specifically*: a soldier's outfit usually not including clothes and weapons —usually used in plural

• This vacuum cleaner has all of the *accoutrements* for cleaning furniture as well as floors.

Anaphylactic [an-*uh*-f*uh*-**lak**-tik] of, relating to, affected by, or causing anaphylaxis or anaphylactic shock

• And you don't know when you're going to have that one reaction and go into *anaphylactic* shock and maybe drop dead.
