

Playing with the Alphabet



Letter knowledge is the ability to recognize that each letter is different with different sounds and different names.

Letter knowledge is an important early literacy skill. What does this mean for your child? Before your child enters kindergarten, he or she should be introduced to the alphabet through a variety of ways— by singing the alphabet song, sharing alphabet books, writing, and pointing out different letters and sounds in the print around your house and town. A child's eventual success in school begins before she's ever entered through the doors of her first classroom.

Would you be surprised to learn that a child's knowledge of the alphabet when she enters kindergarten is one of the best predictors of her 10th grade reading ability?

For babies, playing with shapes and blocks help builds the foundation for learning the alphabet.

Toddlers and preschoolers can play with the ABCs by making letters out of play dough, using their whole bodies to write letters in the air, feel the shapes of letters with sandpaper letters, and play with foam, block and magnetic alphabet sets.

Choose alphabet books with clear, simple representations of letters—both lower and upper case—and illustrations of familiar objects.

Once a child has learned the ABCs, move on to books that illustrate the different sounds each letter makes.

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


Fall Early Literacy Activities

Inspired by Leaf Man by Lois Ehlert & Pumpkin Town (or nothing is better or worse than pumpkins) by Katie McKy



Leaf Man by Lois Ehlert tells the story of a man made of leaves who blows away, traveling where the wind takes him. After reading the story, take a nature walk outside and collect leaves, nuts, seeds, and sticks to make a leaf man or nature collage with your child. Talk about the journey your child's leaf man might take in the wind.



Pumpkin Town! (or nothing is better or worse than pumpkins) by Katie McKy is a good fall-themed read-aloud illustrating that there can be "too much of a good thing." After a plentiful pumpkin harvest, five brothers get rid of the pumpkin seeds they no longer need. When the seeds get carried by the wind and cover the town, sprouting vines and pumpkins everywhere, the brothers must find

a way to save the town. After reading the story with your child, cut open a pumpkin and clean out the seeds. Roast the seeds to eat or use for counting, sorting or for decorating a collage. Counting and sorting helps build early math skills.
