Creativity comes naturally to children! Having children think up their own endings to stories helps develop their imagination. Being ready to learn includes a healthy dose of creativity!




#### New DVDs!







### **Curious Little Scientists**



If you've spent much time with young children, you know that they are naturally curious.

Anyone with a preschooler at home knows all too well the seemingly endless questions of "why?" This curiosity serves them well. From birth on, human beings are learning and discovering all about the world around them. Even a simple game of playing with blocks is the start of mathematical and scientific thinking.

When a baby puts those blocks in her mouth, she is learning about taste, texture and size. When a toddler begins to stack blocks and then watches as they tumble down, he is gaining an understanding of shapes and basic geometry, how balance and gravity work, and learning about patterns and relationships between size and space. Preschoolers and schoolaged children may play more elaborately—building pretend cities and structures, all the while playing with beginning physics and engineering concepts.

It may look like simple play, but all of this exploring becomes the foundation for later scientific thinking.

#### Stumped by a preschooler?

Parents and caregivers want to encourage a child's curiosity, but we're often unsure of the answers to their questions. We can learn right alongside them by finding out the answers in books. Combining a child's natural curiosity about a subject with reading a story and further exploring the topic in a non-fiction book can really build a child's knowledge and love for learning!

What is your child interested in?
Start with a visit to the public
library and check out a few books
to encourage their curiosity,

discovery, and play. After all, playing is how our little scientists learn!

The library's **juvenile non-fiction** collection contains many simple, easy-to-read factual books that explain basic science and nature concepts. Search the kids catalog or ask a librarian for help!


### Winter Early Learning Activities






