Picture Walk

Bonding with your child is one of the great experiences of reading with your child. How can you make this experience interesting and positive for both of you, when your toddler has asked you to read the same book for the twentieth time in two days? Try a picture walk! Which means having a conversation about the book as you "walk" through the book. For example, "I see 3 kittens, can you count them?", "Hmmm, what do you think he is going to do with all that sand?", "Yes, we've been to the park. What is your favorite thing to do at the park?".

This conversation keeps your child engaged, and gives him or her the chance to practice turn taking. In the process, you are also extending what your child is saying, introducing new vocabulary and further developing his or her language skills! Wow!

Teaching About Disabilities Through Books

Children's literature can provide a window into a world that is not familiar to a child, thus providing opportunities for building awareness and understanding. They can also be a sort of "mirror" into which children see themselves reflected. "When books act as both windows and mirrors, they allow children to stretch themselves beyond their circle of experience, yet reflect on similarities between themselves and characters in the book" (Teaching About Disabilities Through Children's Literature, by Mary Prater and Tina Dyches). It is in this way that books can help children see past other's differences and accept people who appear different from them.

The following are recommendations of picture books that contain characters with disabilities. This list is not comprehensive. Please ask a reference librarian at your local library if you need assistance finding more resources.



Nathan's Wish by Laurie Lears

A boy with cerebral palsy helps out at a raptor rehabilitation center and

is inspired himself when an owl that cannot fly finds another purpose in life.



Ian's Walk: A story about autism by Laurie Lears

A young girl realizes how much she cares for her

autistic brother Ian when he gets lost at the park.



Hooway for Wodney Wat by Helen Lester

All his classmates make fun of Rodney because he can't pronounce his name,

but it is Rodney's speech impediment that drives away the class bully.



Ben, King of the River by David Gifaldi

Chad experiences a range of emotions when he goes camping with his parents

and his five-year-old mentally disabled brother Ben who has many developmental problems.



Shelley, the Hyperactive Turtle by Deborah Moss

After getting into trouble by not paying

attention, Shelley the turtle is diagnosed with ADHD and his behavior improves.



Lucy's Picture by Picture Nicola Moon

A young girl creates a special picture that her blind grandfather

can "see" with his hands.

Moses Goes to a Concert by Isaac Millman

Moses and his schoolmates, all deaf, attend a concert where the orchestra's percussionist is also deaf. Includes illustrations in sign language and a page showing the manual alphabet.



Luna and the Big Blur: A story for children who wear glasses by Shirley Day

A young girl who hates her glasses learns to appreciate them after spending a day without them. Includes note to parents.



Susan Laughs by Jeanne Willis

Rhyming couplets describe a wide range of common emotions and activities

experienced by a little girl who uses a wheelchair.

Early Learning Activities: All About ME

What's in a name? Letters as well as some personality! Here are some suggestions of fun "all about me" activities to do together:

Make a <u>name card</u>— cut a piece of card stock or poster board to size, cut out square blocks of letters in your child's name from magazines, or purchase foam letters from a dollar store. Stick them on the card,

decorate around it with stickers or colors. Hang the name card up in your child's space.

<u>Self Portrait</u>—This can be done in different mediums—paint, markers, paper collage, found objects. Help your child look into the mirror and talk about the parts of his body, the color of his eyes and hair. Talk about what is unique about him. Then create

an "all about me book" with your child, writing down information such as, "I am (5 years old)", "My favorite food is (pasta)", "I like to (dig in the sandbox)", "My favorite place is (under my bed)", and so on.

The self portrait can be the cover page of the book. Don't forget to give the book a title and include the author's name!
