Literacy In Science

Young children have a great sense of wonder and curiosity that naturally aids them in their learning about the world. It is this sense of "what is that?" and "why?" that makes them great little scientists.

Through the exploration of their surroundings, children develop literacy skills such as vocabulary and writing. According to an article in "Early Years Are Learning Years" from NAEYC excerpted from Kathleen Conezio and Lucia French's article "Science in the preschool Classroom", science for young children is "finding out about the

world that surrounds them", and "science gives children something to talk, read, and write about".

Further more, the skills
that are essential in the
study of science and math
are also the crucial skills
that help make a strong
reader and writer—these
include "predicting,
understanding cause and
effect, understanding sequence,
acquiring a rich vocabulary, building
background knowledge, and
developing the ability to read and

write informational text" (ReadingRockets.org, Literacy In Sciences).

So the next time you take a walk with your child around the neighborhood, talk to her about what she sees, hears, smells, tastes and touches. Make a book about the experience together through drawings, words, photographs,

collages of found objects, or charts. Then read up on books about topics that interest her.





Very beginning reader books have a limited vocabulary that is repeated throughout the story and/or words which rhyme and are easy to decode. Very beginning readers need to be fun!



Early Literacy Activities

Make Your Own "Like Danny" book

Using pictures from your own family album, you can help your child make her own unique book. For example, you can have a picture of Sally playing with a ball, a picture of Sally riding her tricycle, then a picture of her on a swing. Glue or tape each picture on a piece of paper with space for words, and staple the pages together into a book.

The words could read like this:

Sally likes to throw.

Sally likes to ride.

Sally likes to swing.

The important thing to remember is to have fun with the activity, and to talk and listen to each other.

Find a match

Put out several boxes or containers of different sizes and shapes with their lids separated out. Encourage your child to find the match and put the lids back on, keeping in mind your child's abilities. With an older child, try to find lids and caps that twist on, or snap on, or pop in. Trying to find matches require:

- visual perception (is this the right shape?),
- eye-hand coordination (can I put this together?),
- motor skills (can I twist with my fingers to put this on?).
- persistence by "testing" different ones out.

These skills provide the foundation for learning to read and write.

Feature Author and Illustrator: Nancy Tafuri

Nancy Tafuri's picture books feature large, colorful illustrations, and simple text that are often repetitive and easy for young children to predict what may come next.

Her book "Have You Seen My Ducking?" was a 1985 Caldecott Honor Book.
