Curious About Summer Reading?

Summer is a great time to enjoy reading together indoors and outdoors! Research shows that reading aloud to young children is the single most important activity for preparing them to become successful readers. Starting June 13th, come to the Corvallis-Benton County Public Library and pick up your <u>Curious George summer reading packet</u> for children ages birth to five. The packet will include:

- A Curious George gameboard to record each day that you read to your child.
- Stickers that your child can attach to the gameboard for each day that you read together.

When the gameboard is complete, you can stop by the library to receive a certificate and a \$3 coupon to use at the Corvallis and Albany Farmers' Market.

- ABC 1-2-3 with Cinda Tilgner: combining music and learning in fun ways, July 28th, 10 a.m. in the Main Meeting Room.

Early Literacy Everywhere

As you are out and about this summer, don't forget to continue to read aloud to the kids, have writing instruments available for them to create stories and pictures, point out signs, numbers, and letters of the alphabet all around you, sing and make up funny rhymes, tell stories, and relate new and old experiences. All these things will help your child develop the important foundations for learning to read. In the case of the reading child, this will reinforce his reading skills and broaden his vocabulary as well as his comprehension.

Additional fun activities that your family can do to enhance your child's early literacy skills:

- 1. Take photos of family activities and let the children make their own scrapbook—help them write down their thoughts about the activity or experience.

Wobbler Storytime is Back!

Starting June 1st 2011, Wobbler Storytime for children ages <u>12 to 24</u> <u>months</u> will return to it's previous line-up on <u>Fridays</u>, at **10 a.m.** in the Storytime Room at the Corvallis-Benton County Public Library.

All families with young children are invited to come to the library's storytimes. However, children will benefit most by coming to the storytime for his or her age group because the storytimes at the Corvallis library are designed to meet the developmental level and needs of children in specific age groups. The following schedule may help families decide the one in which to participate:

Tuesdays—Toddler Storytime (ages 24-36 months)

Wednesdays—Infant Storytime (ages 0-12 months)

Thursdays—Preschool Storytime (ages 36 months and up)

Fridays—Wobbler Storytime (ages 12-24 months)

** All storytimes are a half-hour long starting at 10 a.m., and takes place in the Storytime Room at the Corvallis-Benton County Public Library.

FREE Summer Meal Site (June 21st—September 3, 2011)

Ride the city bus for free to the library this summer and have a free lunch at the Corvallis-Benton County Public Library Storytime Room. Children and youth 1-18 years-old can receive a free lunch, Monday through Friday, from 12:15—12:45 pm. Meals must be eaten on site. Parents can purchase a meal for \$3.00. The free lunch program is provided by the Corvallis School District.
