Week 2 Day 10: Animal Studies – Roosters, Hens, and Chicks

Read and watch the stories at <u>Scholastic Learn at Home</u> and then explore the activities below!

Read!

Rosie's Walk by Pat Hutchins and paired with <u>A Chick Grows Up</u> by Pam Zollman

Talk!

What Other Animals Hatch from an Egg?

Ask your child what other animals he or she thinks hatch from an egg? Some examples: snakes, turtles, frogs, lizards, ducks, birds, dinosaurs, fish. Then pretend to be that animal together.

Sing!

Five and Five Eggs Rhyme

5 eggs, 5 eggs,	(hold up one hand, then the other)
That makes 10.	(hold both hands up)
Sitting on top,	(put one hand on top and slightly above the other, wrapping fingers over the top of the fingers on the hand below)
Is the mother hen.	
Crack, crack, crack,	(clap hands 3 times)
What do you see?	(palms up on sides of body, questioning gesture)
10 little chicks,	(hold 2 hands up)
As cute as can be!

- You can make this activity more challenging by cutting out the individual stages into little cards, then have your child tell you or show you how the egg becomes a chicken by arranging the pictures in sequence, like a storyboard.
- You can also make this into a book. Your child can glue each card onto a piece of paper. Ask what is happening in each stage, and write down your child's explanation. Staple the pages together in sequence, including a title page with your child's name. This is good opportunity for your child to practice writing his or her name. Now you can read the book together.

Chicken and the Eagle Game:

- Designate one person as the eagle, one person as the mama hen and the others can be the chicks.
- The chicks line up behind mama hen and hold on (tightly) to the waist of the person in front.
- The mama hen spreads out her arms to protect her chicks from the eagle, who is facing the hen and trying to "catch" one of her chicks.
- The mama hen and chicks have to work together and stay together. Watch out! The last chick at the end of the line tends to get caught!
- Take turns being the mama hen, eagle or chick.
