





Raising Musical Kids

The love of music begins early: babies respond to music; rocking to the music or calming down to the tune of a lullaby. (Scientists have found that babies respond to their mother's voice and singing in the womb!) As they learn to talk, babies are playing with the sounds and rhythm of language. There are plenty of ways to incorporate music in your child's life from the start, even without formal lessons.

- Sing! Sing to your baby and keep singing to them and with them as they grow. Your baby loves your voice, no matter what your skill level!
- Listen to music together -Iullabies, kids music, your favorite songs. Check out our Juvenile Music CD collection!
- Enjoy musical games clap, march, dance, and tap your

way around the house.

- Play with musical instruments. Toy instruments, real instruments, and ones you create out of pots and pans and objects at home. Get inspired by reading *Pots* and Pans! by Patricia Hubbell (E Hubbell).
- Come to library storytime! We do a lot of fun singing and moving to the music in between stories.
- Go see live music! Check out family-friendly musical events around town.
- Sing a book with a child! There are many picture books based on favorite children's tunes, like Old MacDonald Had a Farm, Wheels on the Bus, Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star, and many more. One of

- my favorite books to sing along with (and it comes with a cd of the music!) is Portside Pirates by Oscar Seaworthy (J811.6 SEAWORTH).
- Read books about music: how instruments are made. different types of music, and the lives of composers.

The Corvallis Library offers a Family Music Program presented by local music teachers every third Saturday of the month at 11:00 a.m.. Local music stores also may have information about music teachers that work with young children when your child is ready to take the leap into learning to play an instrument. I'll leave you with one of my favorite quotes:


